The flu vaccination programme has been extended in Scotland this year and includes all those over 50 years of age, those aged 6 months to 49 years who have certain underlying health conditions which increase the risk, all health and social care staff

The flue vaccination programme will run from September 2021 until March 2022. The Scottish Government are urging all those who are eligible to take up the offer as soon as possible when they are invited to get the vaccine. Their website says:

'This year our immunity may be even lower than usual due to lower levels of the flu virus circulating last year as a result of the crucial public health measures in place to protect the



population from COVID-19. Therefore this year, more than ever, it is important to get the flue vaccinn to ensure everyone is protected.'

Ospreys Fly Their Special Nesting Platform

As you know I have a love of all things animal related and I saw this story and it caught my attention so I thought I would share it with you.

SSEN Transmission's Alyth substation team bid a fond farewell to three osprey chicks last month, as they spread their wings and fledged their purpose-built home to start their first journey to Africa.

It was a bittersweet moment for the team as the chicks had become an important part of the daily works on site over the last six months.



The three chicks were reared by a pair of ospreys who have made their home on a specially-built nesting platform originally constructed by SSEN Transmission in March 2014.

The platform was created as an alternative home for the ospreys ahead of the commencement of a programme of upgrade and reinforcement work to the East Coast transmission network, after the birds were spotted nesting at the top of one of SSEN Transmission's 48-metre-high electricity towers, which was scheduled for maintenance as part of the project.

To make sure the birds were safe it was important to try and encourage them to find an alternative nest home, and much to the delight of the environmental team, the ospreys immediately selected to nest in the new purpose built 25m-high platform on their return the following spring. In fact, they were so impressed with their new platform, they have been returning there to breed every year since. Since that first breeding season in 2014, a total of 14 osprey chicks have been observed to have fledged from the new site.

The new £86 million substation near Alyth is being constructed as part of the enhancement of the transmission network, with main construction works getting underway in the summer this year. Site teams have been taking great care to mitigate against any impact around the ospreys since they returned to breed in early April this year. Ornithologists were onsite every day to observe the ospreys and ensure steps were being taken by our contractors to minimise any impact on the birds. The birds have since left the nest to begin their migration to Africa, and it is hoped that they will return to breed again in the spring next year.

Post Office card accounts closure delayed

The Post Office card accounts (POca) scheme was previously set to end in November this year. Following the disruption caused by the pandemic, it has now been extended for 12 months to ensure everyone has the time to make alternative arrangements.

The Department for Work and Pensions is writing to all customers who currently receive payment into a POca, telling them the service is ending and encouraging those who are able to open a bank account to do so.

Those who remain unable to access such services will be migrated onto a new Payment Exception Service, which allows them to choose how they receive their payments.

Easy Cook Recipe

Mexican Bean Casserole

(Serves 2)

Ingredients

1 tsp vegetable oil
1/2 medium onion diced
1/2 red pepper sliced
1 clove of garlic crushed
1/4 tsp ground cumin
200g can mixed beans in water, drained
200g can sweetcorn, drained
100ml water

Method

- Heat oil in saucepan over a medium heat. Add online and cook until it starts to soft Then add red pepper, garlic and cumin and cook for a further 2 minutes,
- 2. Add the mixed beans, tomatoes and sweetcorn and stir.
- 3. Add the water and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and cover the pan and leave to simmer for 20 minutes.
